She attended their regular meeting on February 8 and talked about her Y'Barbo and Pantalion family. The focus was on solving a 30-year-old mystery concerning the Pantalion name. The members were friendly and welcoming, which provided a very pleasant experience. A lovely lunch at City Hall Cafe and Pie Bar followed the meeting.





March 2 – Texas Independence and Flag Day March 6 – Alamo Heroes Day March 27 – Goliad Heroes Day March 1-31 – Texas History Month

On March 2, 1836, fifty-nine men met in a blacksmith shop in Washington-on-the-Brazos to sign the Texas Declaration of Independence. Most wanted to be on the battlefield, but Houston convinced them of the importance of this document. He felt it would give the Texians some legitimacy in their fight with Mexico and help elicit help from the United States. It was also Houston's birthday.

We commemorate this event annually with a major parade up Congress Avenue.

Four days later, on March 6th, the Alamo fell when



Santa Anna's troops stormed the mission building and killed all the defenders. This, of course, is the origin of the rousing call *Remember the Alamo!* The names of the defenders who died are engraved on a granite memorial at the site, and the Alamo is now one of the most sacred sites in Texas.

Following the fall of the Alamo, the Mexican army, under the command of Gen. Santa Anna, attacked Col. James W. Fannin's men at Goliad. Fannin was forced to surrender. On March 27th, 320 men were executed. It was the largest loss of life in the fight for Texas' independence.

This Month In Republic of Texas History

March 24, 1843 Rancho Salado, Texas

The remaining 176 of 248 Texian prisoners who surrendered after the ill-fated Mier Expedition drew from a jar of 176 beans, 159 white and 17 black, in a "lottery of death." Those who drew the black beans were given a little time to conclude their affairs and write their families, then at sunset they were lined up and shot. The next morning the remaining prisoners were handcuffed and ordered to continue their march to Mexico City.

The program begins at the same historic hour to commemorate the anniversary of the March 6th Battle of the Alamo and solemnly remember the men who fought and died for the Republic of Texas.

All participants attending will be honoring the supreme sacrifice made in the cause of Texas Independence. Field Trip to Goliad and Gonzales

We viewed and toured the Fannin Memorial Monument, where Col. James Fannin and his men were buried long after the Goliad Massacre; the Angel of Goliad statue honoring Francisca Alvarez (who offered



aid and comfort to Fannin's men while they were prisoners); and Presidio La Bahia, a Spanish fort built in 1721 that was later used by Mexican troops, then by Fannin before the Massacre. After a delicious lunch at the Blue Quail Deli on the square in Goliad, we set back out and visited the Fannin Battleground Memorial, and Goliad State Park and the Spanish Mission Espiritu Santu. We then drove to Gonzales where we toured the Gonzales Memorial Museum, home of the original "Come and Take It" cannon (it's tiny!); and we visited the Eggleston House, one of the first homes built in Gonzales after the Runaway Scrape. For those of you

who are interested, we were able to get two stamps in our Revolution and Republic Historic Sites Passport (Presidio La Bahia and Fannin Battleground), one stamp in the Texas State Parks Passport (Goliad SP), and one in the National Parks Passport (Goliad SP is a visitor station for the El Camino Real de los Tejas National Historic Trail).




